CAPITAL CREDITS

A Co-op Membership Benefit

s a member of Scenic Rivers Energy Cooperative (SREC), you may have heard the term "capital credits" before and wondered what it means.

Additionally, there is a capital credit patronage allocation and a retirement of capital credits, further mudding the water. And, what are margins? And, what does it all mean to you? Let's make it easier.

- **Member** That's you, or whoever signed the membership form when you first started receiving electricity from SREC.
- Margins These are the income minus expenses for each year and they're distributed proportionately to active members based on total electricity used that same year.
- Capital Credit Patronage Allocation (CCPA) Noted on your bill statements, this represents your previous year's share of the SREC margins. This is not cash back and has no cash value...yet.
- Capital Credit Retirements When it is financially feasible, the board of directors will retire previously allocated margins, which equals cash back for you!

Where are my capital credit funds?

If you think you should have received a check in the mail, but didn't, please call us during regular business hours. It is possible we do not have your current mailing address.

At a recent meeting, the board of directors voted to retire a percentage of the previously allocated capital credits from 1996 through 2019, totaling more than \$1,000,000. If you are a current SREC member, your capital credit retirements appear on your October bill statement as a credit. If you are no longer an active member, a check will be mailed to your last known address.

What happens to unclaimed funds?

SREC makes a diligent effort to return all allocated capital credits back to our current and former members as state law requires. However, if we cannot locate a member, after three years, the funds become "unclaimed" and are placed in our Federated Youth Foundation account. Funds in this account are used strictly to award college scholarships and to fund youth activities and youth education programs throughout our service territory that benefit our members.

ormer director Raymond Martin was committed to public service as well as farming. He became a cooperative member in 1962 when he moved on to his farm on Shanghai Ridge Road. He became a director of Crawford Electric Cooperative in 1990 and then served through the



subsequent merger with Grant-Lafayette Electric. He served a total of 10 years as a board member, ending his career as vice-chairman of the Crawford Electric Cooperative board.

Ray was well known throughout Crawford County as he served on the Eastman Township Board, the Crawford County Board of Supervisors, the Crawford County Fair Board, and the Highway Commission for many years. He proudly drove one of his antique tractors in the Eastman Fourth of July parade for many years. Ray and Luella also left a lasting legacy by selling their farm's bottom land on the Kickapoo River to the DNA so it could be enjoyed for generations to come.

Ray and his wife, Luella, were married for 66 years. He is survived by three children, eight grandchildren, and 13 great-grandchildren. One of Ray's greatest joys during his retirement was watching his grandchildren play sports. He will be remembered fondly for teaching his grandchildren how to lick ice cream cones correctly.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Did you know using your dishwasher is more energy efficient than washing a load of dishes by hand? To maximize efficiency, wash full loads in the dishwasher and don't block the arms or other parts that move while the appliance is in use.

For additional savings, turn on the "air dry" setting instead of using the "heat dry" setting and use a rinse aid to help dishes dry faster without spotting and streaking.
